

This book is a great read! This book describes different appearances of the phenomena of waves, in water, air, the earth, the esophagus, the brain, the electromagnetic field, traffic and spectators in a stadium. There is not an obvious definition of what a wave is; often people give imprecise verbal definitions like "a disturbance through a medium", which are similar to Euclid's inadequate definition of a straight line. ("A straight line is a line which lies evenly with the points on itself.") A book like the present one is the best way to sort out what waves are, by having different examples displayed to us of things that seem like waves. The world would be better off if there were more books like this: that talk about a phenomenon without on the one hand being technical and without on the other hand giving a vulgarization so detached from what actually happens as to teach the reader nothing (like so many popularizations of relativity theory and quantum mechanics).

I have not finished yet but so far as I can see this is truly a science book so the info is great but hard to digest. I had to read many passages more than once. Great info though and worth having if you are a water enthusiast.

I enjoyed this book for the knowledge of all types of waves that surround us, not just the ocean waves, and for the scientific comedic philosophizing, which I like to think included just a dash of agnosticism hidden in the mix underneath Pinney's awe for the universe around him. Swell reading indeed ;-)
