Writing in disjointed present tense, D Wolfin gives us a wildly uneven attempt at the litRPG genre (or a variation therein). While there are some original ideas that seem to hold the kernel of some interesting ideas, the character development, plot, pacing, and dialogue are all sophomoric, which made the book difficult for me to finish. At the *very least*, the author needs a good editor who can advise and help him craft the story better - someone with strong opinions on form and content, not just a copy editor who will check for spelling, format and layout.

The best book of the author so far. What is the soul and do we need one to be 'human'? Read and find out how our soulless MC tries to find his place in the society. Love the fact that the MC is better suited for crafts rather than the usual warrior/assassin. Also, if you loved G.R. Cooper Omegaverse series, you'll definitely love this one.

Relatively uninteresting due to my own preferences. I found the development of the children and their character somewhat..forced. Writing about children, from their perspective etc. for an adult - is always a slippery slope. It's hard to avoid sounding too adult, too analytic etc. This book had plenty of that. If that wasn't enough, the author decided to make the protagonist emotionless - which is another slippery slope. Because it is debatable - what an individual loses together with emotions. How much cognitive thinking, how much motivation etc. None of which seemed to be the problem for the protagonist for most of the beginning of the book. Seeing as I did not finish it yet completely, I'm assuming the fact that he is "soulless" is only from the perspective of all those around and not an actual fact itself or something along those lines. Because if not? Well that was another slip down the slope. I'd also like to add, that the book wasn't edited that well. There were still a few mistakes and weirdly structured sentences. Not a lot, sure..but no more than without an editor. That's all the criticism I got. The book itself was ok, might be even good if the setting is of interest to you. Sadly, it was not so for me. Which was what influenced my opinion on the creation more or less.

This book starts off very slow but as you get to know the characters you're hooked. The characters are well done and the story moves faster as you get onto it. Regal is the MC and finds his way regardless of the hostility and hardships he endures. I will definitely buy the next book. This is not
